Readings for today: Acts 10:34-43 or Jeremiah 31:1-6, Psalm 118:1-2, 14-24, Colossians 3:1-4 or Acts 10:34-43, John 20:1-18

CALL TO WORSHIP

Here's an active reading of one of Paul's letters. I've thrown in some questions (**Bold**, **italic**) **Colossians 3: 1-4**

If you are fair dinkum when you say you have been raised to new life with Christ, then commit yourself to the things that belong to such a life. (if these were actions, what would they be?) Look to Christ — God's right hand man — and take your cues from him. Concentrate on the things that matter to Christ, (what are these attitudes?) and don't let yourselves get hooked into the agendas that preoccupy the world around you. (How many of these agendas can you count?) Your old life is behind you — dead and buried — and your new life is intimately bound up with Christ, and lived in God. The full reality of this new life is not visible to the general public yet, but it will be. (when will this be?) Because your life is now bound to Christ, when Christ makes his triumphant return to the public stage, you will be there with him, in all your glory, for all to see. ©2001 Nathan Nettleton LaughingBird.net

DISCIPLESHIP THOUGHT

Brokenness does not have the final word. Death and hate, violence and injustice do not have the final say. Love renews, restores and reforms a new future. In Matthew's Gospel, the angel and Jesus both bring good news prefaced by "do not be afraid". The news of resurrection may be a scary thing. Jesus did not return to restore what already was. He did not return to resume ministry as it already had been. God was doing a new thing. The disciples and God's work in the world was recreated - out of the brokenness of the cross and the pain of the betrayal, denial and death of Christ - a new thing was formed. The remarkable part of the Easter story is that we are included in this new thing that is happening in the world. God calls us to be part of renewing, restoring and reforming the brokenness of the world, ours included, into a glorious future of hope.

PRAYER

Jesus Christ, the one who is love, we bring you our hearts and hands, our time, relationships and resources that we may respond to the love that you have first given to us. With joy and thanksgiving in our hearts we pray. Amen.

John 20:1-18 CEV

On Sunday morning while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene went to the tomb and saw that the stone had been rolled away from the entrance. She ran to Simon Peter and to Jesus' favourite disciple and said, "They have taken the Lord from the tomb! We don't know where they have put him."

Peter and the other disciple started for the tomb. They ran side by side, until the other disciple ran faster than Peter and got there first. He bent over and saw the strips of linen cloth lying inside the tomb, but he did not go in.

When Simon Peter got there, he went into the tomb and saw the strips of cloth. He also saw the piece of cloth that had been used to cover Jesus' face. It was rolled up and in a place by itself. The disciple who got there first then went into the tomb, and when he saw it, he believed. At that time Peter and the other disciple did not know that the Scriptures said Jesus would rise to life. So the two of them went back to the other disciples.

Mary Magdalene stood crying outside the tomb. She was still weeping, when she stooped down and saw two angels inside. They were dressed in white and were sitting where Jesus' body had been. One was at the head and the other was at the foot. The angels asked Mary, "Why are you crying?"

She answered, "They have taken away my Lord's body! I don't know where they have put him."

As soon as Mary said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there. But she did not know who he was. Jesus asked her, "Why are you crying? Who are you looking for?"

She thought he was the gardener and said, "Sir, if you have taken his body away, please tell me, so I can go and get him."

Then Jesus said to her, "Mary!"

She turned and said to him, "Rabboni." The Aramaic word "Rabboni" means "Teacher."

Jesus told her, "Don't hold on to me! I have not yet gone to the Father. But tell my disciples that I am going to the one who is my Father and my God, as well as your Father and your God." Mary Magdalene then went and told the disciples that she had seen the Lord. She also told them what he had said to her.
